







Bonnie Bone










Bonnie was born in May, but we do not know the day. When she was over 8 weeks old, she was allowed to leave her parents.

Just like us, she gets her features from a little bit of her Mum and a little bit of her Dad.




Look closely at the photo of Bonnie's parents.

West Highland Terrier




Poodle



Yorkshire Terrier


What does Bonnie's breed tell us about her personality?
