Our topic in Hendra class for the Summer term is:

Lovely to still see so many of your home learning activities on Class Dojo. I knew you would all enjoy this animal based topic! I know lots of you had a go last week at

sorting and classifying the animals into the correct group-mammal, reptile, bird, insect, amphibian or fish. If you didn't then have a go this week, the pictures are all on the last home learning sheet- or, even better, draw your own! This next task asks you to expand your 'favourite animal' choice by picking your favourite in all of the above groups. We are going to make our own animal information book, all about our favourite animals. What is your favourite mammal? Your favourite reptile? etc. and why? Once you have decided which your favourite in each group is, draw a picture of the animal and write a sentence underneath, similar to my examples below. Some children will need support to 'build' the sentence and particularly to think of reasons. Write each sentence on a separate page if you can because we are going to add some facts to each page afterwards!

Here are my modelled examples!

My favourite mammal is a cat because they are clever, adventurous and purr when they are happy. My favourite reptile is a leopard gecko. I like leopard geckos because they have very beautiful markings. My favourite bird is a barn owl because I love how they fly silently and gracefully at nightime. My favourite insect is a stag beetle. They are such interesting beetles and have huge antlers like a stag. My favourite amphibian is a red-bellied newt. I love the bright red colour of their bellies. My favourite fish is definitely a great white shark. Although I wouldn't want to meet one, they are very interesting and exceptional predators.

Can you see how I have used lots of adjectives to describe my animals? Try and use some interesting ones in your sentences too! Remember to use a comma in between two adjectives. Here is a list of adjectives you could pick:

Also, I have written a mix of sentences with and without the word because to show the extra bits of information. Try and do the same with your sentences. E.g.

My favourite amphibian is a red-bellied newt. I love the bright red colour of their bellies.

Is two separate sentences with a full stop at the end of each one.

My favourite mammal is a cat because they are clever, adventurous and purr when they are happy.

Is one sentence with the word 'because' and also commas to separate adjectives.

Once you have decided on your favourite animal in each group and written your sentences, it's time to start adding some facts! Maybe you could discover what the animal eats? What habitats they prefer? What countries are they native too? If you don't have any information books about animals at home there will of course, be lots of information online about the animals you have chosen. The National Geographic for Kids website (https://www.natgeokids.com/uk/) is a good place to start, as is the DK Find Out websites (https://www.dkfindout.com/uk/).

Try and find 3 facts for each animal you have chosen. How you display the facts underneath your sentence is up to you! Perhaps you could draw 3 stars and write each fact inside the star? You could put them inside speech bubbles coming out of the picture of your animal? Be as inventive as you like! You might prefer to just write them as sentences underneath the sentence you have written explaining why the animal is your favourite. Make sure you can read the sentence back to a grown-up with their help if needed.

I would also like you to pick one or more of the activities on the RSPCA website to have a go at over the next couple of weeks. There is a wide selection of acitivities that will get the children considering all the wildlife they may find in the local area:

Remember, as well as books and websites, a good way of children encountering new animals is by watching some animal documentaries online. I had planned to watch clips of \*Planet Earth in class and ask the children to look out for animals that they have never seen before. Each link is to a separate maths problem. There is always a link to the 'solution' at the end of the problem. I usually familiarise myself with the solution before going through the problem with the children- it helps to keep them on the right track. As you are working through these, try and use questions to support your child's thinking. Don't let yourself of your child get frustrated though-sometimes sharing the solution and helping your child understand is more valuable than them finding it too difficult. Some of the problems will be easier to solve if your child does some drawings to help them work it out.
